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Definitions and Characteristics of Elder Abuse

A single or repeated act or lack of appropriate action, occurring within any relationship where there is an expectation of trust which causes harm or distress to an older person.

(WHO/INPEA, 2002, p. 3)

- Types of abuse: Financial (42%) Psychological (35%), Neglect (10%), Physical (8%), Social (5%), Sexual (0.1%)
- Perpetrators (trust): 95% family members
 - Daughter/Son 72%, Spouse/partner 11%, Grandchild 6%, Other relatives 3%, Friends 3%, Informal carer 2%, Siblings 2%, Intimate personal carer 1% ('non-trust' abuse 15% of reported cases)



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Pros and Cons of Siloed Responses

Pros

- Allows focus on specific needs and issues of identified vulnerable groups
- Supported by current service design

Cons

- Overlapping vulnerabilities not highlighted = people lost in the gaps Underestimation of extent of the issue
- Piecemeal approach = Missed opportunities for collaboration and learning

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

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Universal Declaration of Human Rights

Article 3

Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

Article 5

No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment

Article 18

Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion;

Article 27

Everyone has the right freely to participate in the cultural life of the community, to enjoy the arts and to share in scientific advancement and its benefits.
